Diary Dates

- St Mary's Bruton welcomed a group of students from Sexey's School to the 11.00 am Eucharist on 20 June; we hope this will be the start of regular visits from Sexey's students.
- The planned end of year services/leavers' services for Bruton School for Girls, King's School Bruton and Sexey's School have sadly had to be cancelled as a result of the continued coronavirus restrictions. Sexey's is planning an outdoor service at the school instead and the Rector will attend.
- Shepton Montague celebrated their patronal festival (the feast of St. Peter, 29th June) at a special outdoor Evensong, followed by a village party to celebrate and say thank you for the ministry of Jeremy Collyer as churchwarden and general all-rounder for many years.
- The works of repair and maintenance at St Peter's Redlynch have been delayed due to the contractor's difficulties with supplies and we are awaiting a new date for this work to be completed.
- Wyke Champflower held its Patronal Festival (Trinity Sunday) on 30 May with a special Evensong at which Fr Mark Ellis preached, followed by a reception in the churchyard in glorious sunshine.
- Wyke Champflower held its annual meeting on 25 June at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Winkley.
- On 25th June The Rector accompanied a group of students from Bruton School for Girls on a post-exam outing - a day's walk in the Mendips, which was a great way of building links with BSG.
- St Mary's has begun to rebuild its junior choir and Harry Mills is due to visit Bruton Primary School to explain the benefits and fun to be had through choral singing.
- The Rector is also due to visit Bruton Primary School to talk about what it is like serving as a parish priest. Hopefully the children will be able to explain how the job should be done.
- The Bruton Primary School end of year service is scheduled to take place on 23 July, with the Y6 leavers (plus parents/carers) only in the building and the service being livestreamed back to the school for the other pupils to watch in their classrooms - what an excellent use of our new livestreaming equipment!
- Across the Benefice, we hope to hold 4 baptisms and 2 weddings this summer. These promise to be occasions of great joy after so many postponements and cancellations.

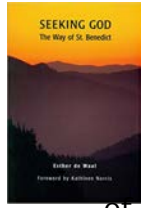

In the story of David and Goliath (1 Samuel 17), what is the best explanation for the oddity that King Saul seems not to know who David is (1 Sam 17: 55-58), despite David already being a known and trusted member of his court (see 1 Samuel 16: 14-23)?

In the story of Jesus calming the storm (Mark 4: 35-41), what is the significance of the pointed reference to crossing to the other side of Lake Galilee? And why does Mark tell us that 'other boats were with him' (v. 36) when these other boats nor the people presumably in them) are not mentioned at all in the rest of the story?
