Diary Dates

The evangelical wing of the church tends to have a tradition of generous personal giving, often 'tithing' (giving a tenth of one's income). The free churches have had to be self-supporting from the outset, whereas Church of England parishes used to benefit from large endowments and did not need much income from worshippers. How times change.

The Church of England's modest aspiration (set in 1978 and probably never achieved) is that we should each give 5% of income (after tax but before other costs) to fund the work of the church. In our Diocese, the average level of personal giving is well below even this 5% level at around £12.00 per week. This low level of income impacts on our ability to maintain our buildings and fund our ministry.

Unless we who attend church become radically more generous individually, or our congregations grow enormously (or both?), then we need to find new ways of generating income if we are to survive. This funding deficit is coming to a head in our times, and it is up to us to respond if we wish to maintain a visible Christian presence through a church in every parish.

Together, we need to increase substantially our programme of social and cultural events and investigate further ways of generating income. If we do it well, this will not only balance the books but will ensure the ongoing vitality of our church communities. We now need much more than the occasional cake sale.

Benefice Services

Baby Loss Awareness Week

This year, it runs from 9 – 15 October. We plan to hold a service jointly with our two neighbouring benefices in Castle Cary and Evercreech. The service will be at St Andrew's, Ansford on Weds 12 October at 6.00 pm.



Benefice Discussion Group

This time we will be looking at the Creeds: what they are, what they mean, which bits we find difficult to understand or to say. All are welcome. Proposed Reduction in Stipendiary Clergy

The Diocesan Strategy for balancing the budget includes, as has been mentioned in this newsletter and in sermons, a reduction in the number of stipendiary clergy. A shortfall in income from parishes (the 'Parish Share') means the Diocese cannot continue to meet the cost of clergy, plus associated housing, pension and training cost, at the current rate. On 11 October, the steering committee for Deanery Synod (the 'Deanery Mission and Pastoral Group') will consider proposals for a revised set of principles to determine how a reduced number of clergy might be deployed across this Deanery. These will then be presented to Deanery Synod at its meeting on 10 November.

Bishop Michael Beasley will be installed as the 80th Bishop of Bath & Wells at a special service at Wells Cathedral on Saturday 12 November at 3.00pm.
