The Rector recently attended a meeting of Diocesan clergy at which there was an opportunity to comment or ask questions about the recent decisions of General Synod in relation to marriage and relationships. You may be aware that General Synod recently considered proposals from the House of Bishops regarding the possible future issuing

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of approved prayers of blessing for couples in same-sex relationships, the decision not to permit the celebration of same-sex marriages in church and the proposed revision of the current guidance regarding sexual conduct for clergy.

These may be issues that concern you personally, or they may be issues that you feel have no relevance to you at all. The meeting, and comment on this issue elsewhere, suggests that it could have potentially significant consequences for us all.

This is because some people within the Church of England are questioning whether they wish to remain part of our Church, given these developments. Indeed, some of the discussion suggests that those who are concerned at these emerging proposals may argue that it is not they who should leave the Church of England but rather those who welcome these changes should be the ones to leave, because (as they see it) it is this group that are departing from the traditional (and, in their view, correct) teaching of the Church.

If a large number of people were to leave the Church of England, or even if they were to remain but arrangements were made for them to be 'separately provided for' (as is currently the case for some of those who do not accept the validity of the ordination of women as priests and bishops), then we are looking, at a minimum, at a potentially very serious impairment of our unity, and at worst full-blown schism.

Any such developments are likely to have a serious impact on Diocesan finances, and hence the ability to fund and support our shared ministry.

Please pray for Bishop Michael, Bishop Ruth and all involved in this process, as they seek to preserve the unity and diversity of our Church.

Benefice Re-organisation

The proposals for restructuring the Benefices in our Deanery are now out for consultation. These have been provided to the Deanery Synod representatives and churchwardens of each parish. Please do look at them, consider them carefully and prayerfully, and make your views known. Under these proposals, our Benefice will be enlarged by the addition of a number of further parishes. It is hard to see how this will be practicable within our current structures and arrangements for ministry, so some changes to what we do and how we do it will almost certainly be required.

With this in mind, on the 5th Sunday of April (30 April) there will be an opportunity for us to come together as a Benefice and consider how we might go about managing the consequences of these changes when they happen. As examples of the issues we might discuss:

- which parishes are able to provide lay people to lead Sunday worship?
- which parishes will have to have fewer Sunday services?

- should we look at the merger of some or all of our parishes, so that we have fewer PCCs?
- who is going to do the increased benefice administration shall we pay someone or do we have willing and able volunteers?
- which parishes are able to provide lay pastoral visitors?
- who is going to lead the engagement with schools and/or parish councils?
- what efficiencies can we make to reduce the administrative workload?
- will we combine more in the future for principal festivals, or are some parishes content not to observe these holy days at all?
- what expenses should we share at benefice level and what expenses should be borne at parish level?
- where should the Rectory be located?
- how will we organise discipleship, fellowship and prayer groups?
- should the post of Rector for the new Benefice be re-advertised?

Details of the time and place of this meeting will be advertised in due course.

All proceeds from this event will be donated to St. Mary's Church.


Request for Recipes


