S.M: 'Community'

Whether it is 'Dry January', 'Veganuary', 'No Mow May', 'Movember' or some other programme, we often come under pressure during a particular month or season to change our behaviour in some way for the better. Diets, de-tox, 'wellness', fitness: the list goes on. This sort of 'nudging' can sometimes be

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helpful and it is generally well meaning. I wonder what your attitude is towards such messaging – perhaps you resolutely ignore it all, or perhaps you try to follow every programme and idea in the hope of a happier, healthier life, or doing your bit to reduce the damage to our environment.

One of Bishop Michael's four guiding principles, as we try together to discern the future for our Church in this Diocese, is Discipleship. By this, he means strengthening and deepening our faith at a personal level. It means focusing more consciously and deliberately on our walk with God. At the recent Deanery Synod meeting, we discussed all four of Bishop Michael's guiding principles (the others being 'cherishing the people we already have', 'establishing new worshipping communities' and 'shared local ministry'). It was suggested that Discipleship underpins these other three areas of activity: unless we have a strong sense of discipleship and faith, we cannot know why we are doing all the other things, nor how to do them.

It struck me that there is a parallel with all of the programmes and initiatives that bombard us in daily life: unless we have a deep and sure underlying sense of who we are and what we are for, we won't know why we should (or should not) be joining in with some particular campaign: 'Is this for me?', 'How does this fit with my life?', 'Is this good?'.

So: how is your Discipleship going? There are many different ways in which we can each seek to strengthen our sense of calling as disciples

of Jesus and many ways in which we can deepen our faith. For some it may be reading the Bible and other books about our faith, for others it might be attending courses or discussion groups, for others it might be pilgrimage or time on retreat. What helps one person does not necessarily help another. But doing it does help everyone.

News from our Parishes

Dr Tim Schroder gave a fascinating talk at St Leonard's about church

silver and the social history which it reveals. Many thanks to the Friends of Pitcombe Church for such an informative and enjoyable evening.

Social history was also a key part of the hugely entertaining performance by the Somerset Russets at St John's, Brewham on 6 October. They played and sang Somerset folk songs and told the stories that lay behind them. The church was close to capacity and it was a thoroughly good evening.

On the 5th Sunday of October, we gathered as a Benefice at St Peter's Redlynch to celebrate the harvest – the last of our harvest festivals this year. It was a joyful occasion – some of us walked from Bruton to the chapel and some shared lunch together at the Montague Inn afterwards.

The Rector held an informal meeting with the PCC of Bratton Seymour on 6 October to discuss the possibility that Bratton Seymour might re-join this Benefice under the Deanery Re-organisation Plan that is currently being progressed.

Deanery Synod met on 19 November and received a presentation on finance from Matthew Pinnock, who is the Head of Finance and Operations for our Diocese.

The Christmas 'Late Night Shopping' event in Bruton is due to take place on 7 December (just about falling within Advent!). We hope to use St Mary's church as part of the event. If you have ideas or suggestions for activities that could be arranged in the church – fundraising or just fun – do please get in touch.

All Souls



All Souls Day is a day when we remember those who have died. All Souls Day falls on 2 November, but this year we will be celebrating it on Friday 3rd November, with a quiet service of reflection and music, including the reading of the names

of the departed. The service will be at St Mary's, Bruton at 6.30 pm.

This can be a very moving service, especially for those who have lost a loved one recently.

Prize Winners

In our Benefice discussion groups, we have been looking at the Book of Psalms. You may remember that the Rector offered prizes for the best answers to two questions relating to the Psalms.

One question was what the meaning of the word 'Selah' is ('Selah' is found as a marginal note in some Psalms). Several people correctly identified meanings of this word that have been suggested by Biblical scholars, the most common one being 'pause' or 'interlude'. But there is no certainty around this meaning; it is at best conjecture. The original meaning of the term is unknown. For that reason, the prize for the best answer to this question goes to Chris Rolls, who offered an imaginative and light-hearted interpretation of the word, rather than an authoritative translation: Surrounding Everyone with Love And Hallelujahs. The acrostic pattern of this answer very much respects the poetic style of the Psalms – well done Chris!

The second question was a challenge to make sense of Psalm 8, verse 2, taking into account the considerable variation in translation in the different versions of the Bible in English. This baffling verse had us all scratching our heads. The prize for the best answer goes to David Slater. He noted that verse 2 seems to bear no relation to

the verses that immediately precede or follow it, and that none of the English, Latin or Greek translations makes any sense. In the light of that, he questioned whether there had been some error in the Hebrew text that underlies our translations, perhaps resulting from scribal error, and pointed out that the reason for such differing translations in English might reflect the translators' attempts to impose some sort of meaning where there is, in truth, none to be had. Well done David! As one Biblical Scholar puts it: 'The meaning of this phrase, however proverbial it has become, has not been satisfactorily explained'.
