Notes from an Absent Organist: Chapter 2

Our organist at St Mary's writes:

On EasterDay 2019, the world awoke to the news that bombs had exploded in churches in Colombo and other towns in Sri Lanka (not at the Ragama Basilica, mercifully) with appalling loss of life. Islamic

fundamentalists were blamed. Their motive was not clearly established, though the reason for choosing Easter Sunday was sickeningly obvious.

As people gathered for the Easter service here at St Mary's, someone gave me a sympathetic hug, knowing that I must be upset, particularly as I was due to fly out the next day. (Thank you, R..., for that kind gesture which is not forgotten.) I did fly out on the Monday, finding a sombre atmosphere prevailing across the island, with different religions and ethnic groups united in their grief. In the course of time, churches were repaired and services resumed. Communities and families stricken by the atrocities can never forget; but if the perpetrators aimed to undermine tolerance and unity in Sri Lankan society, they failed.

On Christmas Day 2023, the world awoke - or at least, one bleary-eyed organist in Bruton still recovering from Midnight Mass awoke – to a brief, less grim news item from Sri Lanka. The government there had declared an amnesty for 10,000 prisoners, who were to be released from jail on Christmas Day! I'm afraid this seems to have been a practical and economic move rather than a magnanimous gesture of support for Christianity. The total capacity of prisons in the country is only about four thousand, so it was becoming impossible to house so many inmates. Of the ten thousand liberated few will have been wicked Christians, indeed few will have been hardened criminals of any religion. In such a poor country many people simply cannot afford to pay even small fines (for traffic offences or whatever) so they are sent to prison. The cost of accommodating them is a far greater burden on the government and tax-payer than the lack of revenue from payment

of fines. The Sri Lankan government apparently recognised this. (Most countries, including Britain, face similar dilemmas; but it is perhaps outside the scope of a church newsletter to discuss the economic issues arising from criminals being kept in prison for a few years – murderers for life – and possible solutions.)

As always, I shall return home with mixed feelings at best. One thing which will distract me from jet-lag as I take my place behind the organ at St Mary's on March 3 is the prospect of playing two unfamiliar hymns: 'Disposer Supreme and Judge of the Earth', and 'The Spacious Firmament on High'. The choir has been asked to rehearse these hymns to give the congregation a good lead. Do give them your best shot as they are among my favourites and I may well play them at my own Memorial Service. Yes, you did read that correctly: please ask me for clarification. Or ask Harry, without whose technical wizardry something seemingly impossible such as this could not come about.

Reform of the Parish Share

The December issue of this newsletter gave an explanation of proposals to reform the calculation of Parish Share. If you missed that, or have forgotten about this issue, back copies of the newsletter are available on the St Mary's website. Please do take note: this is a

potentially very significant reform for us and could result in significant changes in the shape and structure of parish ministry here.

Invitations have now been issued to clergy, churchwardens, PCC treasurers and PCC secretaries to participate in a consultation on these proposals. The topic will be considered by each PCC with a view to the Benefice Council being authorised by each PCC to submit a response to the consultation on behalf of the whole Benefice.

Parish Finance

Have you noticed what has been happening to the rate of inflation and the cost of living recently? If you receive a pension, it is likely to be linked to the rate of inflation, such that it has gone up over the last couple of years, and especially in the last year or two. If you receive a salary, have you had an increase in pay over the last couple of years, whether to reflect promotion or the increased cost of living?

When was the last time you reviewed the amount of your regular giving to your parish church? If you set up your standing order some time ago, unless you have increased it recently, it will now be worth less, perhaps much less, than when you first set it up. Some standing orders to our PCCs have not been increased for many years. If you give by cash when you attend services, are you still giving the same amount each week as you did last year, or the year before, or the year before that? If you do only give when you attend a service, please

consider setting up a standing order in place of or in addition to your cash giving - otherwise, if you are away or unable to attend on a Sunday, your PCC does not receive the gift you want to give.

All our parishes are struggling to make ends meet at the moment. Please do consider whether the level of your giving remains appropriate to your circumstances.

Prayer Ministry

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4: 6-7)

As we think about the things happening in our world, our country, our lives, our benefice and our church that make us anxious, why not try praying about them? There is a hymn that includes these words:

What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear!
What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer!
O what peace we often forfeit,
O what needless pain we bear, all because we do not carry everything to God in prayer!

We are hoping to arrange shared Lent lunches again this year. We have provisionally booked Bruton Community Hall on Wednesdays in Lent (from 15 Feb, but not including Holy Week).

It would be wonderful if this could be an event shared across the entire Benefice and also with other Christian denominations, so do please spread the word.
