


The St Mary's Choirs

The Community Patch Project in Redlynch are starting a veg box scheme this year and you can sign up to receive a bag of delicious, locally produced vegetables every week!

There are two types of boxes:

- Standard £16 6-7 vegetable items per week
- Plus £22 6-7 vegetable items per week PLUS a 'lucky dip' of either a bunch of cut flowers, a range of fresh herbs, or a condiment made from patch produce (e.g. pickles, fermented goods, etc).

We will operate on a collection

point model, so we have points in Bruton, Castle Cary, Wincanton, and Redlynch for you to collect your boxes from every week. The produce in each box will change every week according to what's in season, so you'll have something different to try out new recipes each time. 

Kimberley Snapshot



I know it looks strange to see a distinctly European Church in the middle of the Australian bush, but this is no ordinary church - this church was built in thanksgiving for The deliverance. German Pallotine Order of priests and brothers first went to the West Kimberley in 1901 where they established a mission and school at Beagle Bay on the Dampierland Peninsula above Broome. At the beginning of WW1 the authorities in

Broome arrested all of the German priests and brothers and put them in the Broome Jail, whereupon the town rioted and demanded that these gentle people, who were doing good work amongst the Aboriginals, should be released to continue their work. As a result, a couple of the brothers who had trained in carpentry and building designed and built – with assistance of the whole community both Aboriginal and European – this church as testament to a community united in Faith. Amongst the amazing people educated at Beagle Bay Mission was Djagwyn who was the grandfather to Patrick Dodson – the first Aboriginal Senator in the Upper House of the Australian Federal Government.



Book Recommendation



Jesus does not want Christians. At least not in the sense of people who simply profess certain beliefs about him. As followers of Jesus, our beliefs cannot be separated from how we live. The temptation to separate Christian 'truths' from the lives we live is due to fear of being held accountable and leads to a duplicity that gnaws at our faith. Jesus teaches that it is by

our fruits that we, and he, will be known. The truth of the story we find in the Gospels is known only through the kind of lives it produces. **Stanley Hauerwas.**

Stanley Hauerwas is an American theologian. He has had a huge influence on modern theology, especially in America. He is renowned (notorious?) for making statements that are arresting, provocative, bracing, even shocking. But he does more than craft catchy soundbites ('Jesus does not want Christians') – these pithy statements are always undergirded by serious thought and well-crafted arguments.

An edited collection of short extracts and re-workings of Hauerwas' writings has recently been published. It is called *Jesus Changes Everything: a new world made possible* and is published by Plough Publishing. This gives some insights into his thought without having to read his many books. We may use this as the basis of a benefice discussion group at some point in the future. Have a read and see what you think.


