As trailed here last month, there was a meeting of rural clergy on 1 September to discuss with the Diocesan leadership the emerging shape of future ministry in multi-parish benefices like ours. The basic thinking

is that, unless our financial generosity improves markedly, as a Diocese we will soon not be able to afford the current numbers of paid clergy, so we will have to reduce numbers and spread clergy yet more thinly, creating larger benefices.

In this benefice, while we do receive some generous financial support from a few people, if we look at the total numbers our income from regular donations is very low relative to our number of worshippers and our wealth. Across our benefice of five parishes, those who give regularly (which is by no means everyone who attends) give on average just £10.83 per week (less than the cost of a daily takeaway coffee), which is inadequate to pay our way. In the past, we have survived only because we have been subsidised by other parishes in the Diocese, but that subsidy is now being withdrawn and we have to meet our own costs.

The discussion on 1 September focussed mainly on the perceived need for a change of culture within our Church, moving from a model where the priest is expected to provide much of the ministry personally to a model where the priest is expected to encourage, train and oversee others to provide that ministry. The idea is that we become the sort of Church where ministry is shared among all the people. One consequence of this sort of change would be the reduction in sacramental ministry received in each parish; perhaps most obviously a reduction in the celebration of the Eucharist.

I would be very interested to know how people feel about these proposals for change. Are there people who are willing to get more involved in ministry, say by being trained to lead worship, to preach, to visit the sick or homebound, to prepare liturgy or to take lead responsibility for aspects of church administration and finance and care of our buildings? What is your attitude to the way we receive sacramental ministry, and specifically the Eucharist – essential or expendable? I wonder whether it might be a good idea to hold a benefice-wide meeting to air our thoughts about this matter. There is only any point doing this if people are sufficiently interested that they will participate in the discussion and also, crucially, the solution (whatever that might be).

So, if you would like to attend a meeting of all our parishes to discuss these issues with one another and see what suggestions emerge for how to respond to the Diocesan proposals, please email or ring the benefice office and if there is sufficient interest, we will organise a meeting.

### **Bruton - Organ Concert by David Slater**

#### 'Inque Modum Tonitrus Vox Ferrea Verberat Aures'

Fingers flew seamlessly across keys and swept across digital stops on Saturday 13 September, while feet glided across pedals, as David Slater treated us to a wonderful evening of organ music last month. David has been St. Mary's full-time organist for 20 years, and how lucky we are to have him.

The concert pieces were carefully arranged in groups, and introduced us to music that many of us didn't know. One or two we knew very well, including a spine-tingling rendition of Samuel Barber's *Adagio for Strings*, which, as David modestly suggested, was a piece that would 'transfer well to the medium of the organ'. Each selected piece was long enough to immerse us in its beauty, and short enough to hold our attention when listening to something less familiar.

The information accompanying each piece provided historical context and some fascinating snippets about the composers and their personalities and contemporaries. Take Buxtehude, for example, who was such an accomplished composer that J. S. Bach walked 200 miles to hear him play!

What an enjoyable evening, dedicated to the loving memory of David Mills – a fitting tribute.

### Bruton Parish Church, Williamsburg VA

As some readers of this newsletter know well, there is a church in a city called Williamsburg in the state of Virginia, USA, called 'Bruton Parish Church'. The reason for the name lies deep in America's Colonial past: the Governor of Virginia at the time the church was founded, in 1674, was Sir William Berkeley, son of Sir Maurice Berkeley, of our own Bruton. So the church was named after our parish of Bruton.

Over the years, we have received visitors from Bruton Parish Church, including their choir, and some from our community have also been there to visit. This year, the Rector was invited to visit them – to speak at the annual lunch for the 'Friends of Bruton' and to preach at the Sunday morning services (you can watch the mid-morning service on their YouTube channel should you wish to do so – link at end of article). So, he duly hopped on a plane and crossed the pond.

After a morning walking around the so-called Historic Area of 'Colonial Williamsburg', which is a 'living history-style' reconstruction of the 18th century state capital, the associate priest, Fr Charlie Bauer, and the Chairman of the Friends of Bruton, Dr Jonathan Stolz, kindly guided and filmed a little exploration and explanation of key parts of Williamsburg, explaining the links back to the Old Country. We hope to turn that into a short piece of video that we can use for visitors to St Mary's.

Next, the committee of the Friends of Bruton kindly treated the Rector to a very nice supper in a local restaurant. Fortunately the food was considerably better than that which the first settlers would have had. On the next day, the Rector donned his tidiest shirt and prepared to give a presentation to the 160 or so guests at the annual lunch of the Friends of Bruton – a charity that supports ministry and mission in Bruton Parish and which has a strong and international membership. The talk focused on the history and present day life of Bruton (Somerset) and the current state of ministry and mission in our benefice, and was made very pretty by the use of some stunning photos and a neat little video kindly prepared by volunteers at St Mary's.

After a quick visit to the parish heritage centre and gift shop, it was time for supper with the Chairman of the Friends of Bruton at his home to hear more about their work.

Sunday services were back-to-back at 8am, 9.15am and 11.15am. Afterwards, Dr Stolz laid on a quick visit to Jamestown – the site where the first English settlers landed and established the British colony. It is a remarkable place, giving a strong sense of the spirit of endeavour and exploration that saw the colony survive and grow, including replicas of the ships in which the settlers arrived (tiny!).

After that, a dash back to Williamsburg for an evening Eucharist with students from the College of William & Mary – the local state university – followed by a simple meal with the students in the parish hall.

All in all it was a good chance to deepen the relationship between our two church communities and compare thoughts about the challenges and opportunities facing us in our respective places. Bruton Parish Church are planning a pilgrimage to the UK in June 2026, and we hope to host them for a day, which will be a good opportunity to return the warm and generous hospitality they offered to the Rector on this trip.



















# Rector's Discretionary Fund

Did you know that the Rector has a discretionary fund? This is not for cocktails or trips to the opera, but for him to be able to use to meet the needs of those who come to him in some form of distress or emergency and to offer discrete help to parishioners in financial need. The money is accounted for within the Bruton PCC accounts.

To date, this fund has been provided almost entirely by Valerie Norton through the sale of knitted animals at her garden gate. As many will know, Valerie died in January this year. But in a wonderful gesture, Valerie's husband John has suggested that a further fund of money generated by Valerie should now be transferred into the Rector's discretionary fund. This is the money that people gave when Valerie and Judy Gallannaugh made the colourful tapestry kneelers for St Mary's. Often people gave a donation when a kneeler was made in their name or to their order. But Valerie bore the entire costs of materials herself, so these donations have simply been held in a fund. Now, John has asked and Bruton PCC has agreed that in memory of Valerie and her tireless work and her concern for the poor, these funds should be transferred to the rector's discretionary fund (which was running quite low). So, thank you John, and thank you Valerie.

### 2000 Olympics and Namaaralai

In the early 60s when the Mowanjum Community was on the verge of becoming independent from missionary outreach, they were having a meeting with a group of Ecumenical Church Leaders who were talking about their various churches.



Suddenly Elkin Umbagai, daughter of Sam Woolagoodjah, stood up and said "I don't understand you churches – you're all saying different things about your God and you even fight over your God: look at Northern Ireland! You're killing one another! We Aboriginals only have one Wandjina and we don't fight over him!"

The picture overleaf was taken at the opening ceremony of the Sydney 2000 Olympics. The Wandjina in the picture had been made by Elkin's brother Donny. I was sitting in the Torrent Path Choir waiting to sing the *Tibi Omnes* from the Berlioz *Te Deum*, and when I saw the Wandjina I cried while I sang these words:

To Thee all angels cry aloud: the heavens and all the powers therein;

To Thee cherubim and seraphim continually do cry. Holy, Holy: Lord God of Sabaoth;

Heaven and earth are full of the majesty of Thy glory. The glorious company of the apostles praise Thee.

The goodly fellowship of the prophets praise Thee. The noble army of martyrs praise Thee.|

The holy Church throughout all the world doth acknowledge Thee; The Father of an infinite majesty; Thine honourable, true, and only Son;

Also the Holy Ghost, the Comforter.



### Staying Safe Online

The internet makes life easier in countless ways – shopping, banking, keeping in touch with family, and even healthcare. But with those benefits come risks. Cyber criminals often target older adults because they may be less familiar with new technology or more trusting online, but a few simple steps can help keep you safe.

Come along to a short talk aimed at uncovering and explaining the different things that you can do to keep yourself secure. We'll look at things like how to spot scammers including how to recognise a fake phone call, email, website or even a doorstep visitor.

On top of that we'll talk about how embarassing it can feel when you think you might have been tricked, and how it can sometimes be difficult to ask for help with technology – what if someone laughs? What if your concerns just sound daft? You'll be amazed by how many people from all walks of life and with much or little experience have been victims – you should never feel alone.

Cyber security doesn't necessarily have to be complicated. A few good tricks will go a long way toward protecting your money, privacy, and peace of mind.

We hope to offer this in October, so details will follow on how to join local cyber security experts for a free talk that will demystify at least part of the tech-heavy world which we all inhabit.
