and helps to sustain resilient ecosystems, accepting lower and slower yields than is the case with heavily industrialised and intensive farming practices.

Have you heard about slow television? I believe that this media phenomenon began in Norway, with films that ran in real time, showing (for example) a train journey through the countryside, with the film lasting as long as the journey itself – no editing parts out, no fast forwarding. It seems to be the antidote to the sort of films where every scene lasts only a few seconds before cutting to more action.

Have you heard a 'slow moment' on a radio programme, when they play gentler, softer music for a while as an attempt to aid destressing or decompression and help us to unwind? The BBC now has entire radio channel dedicated to this sort of programming.

Since 'slow' seems to be in vogue, maybe we should rebrand Advent as 'the slow season' in our Christian calendar. Advent is, after all, the season when we are encouraged by our liturgy and lectionary to slow down, to take time to contemplate our own life and the things of God, intentionally to make some space amid the business to consider the coming mystery of the Incarnation. In Advent, we get ready for Christmas, not by rushing around and preparing decorations, food and presents, but by slowing down and preparing ourselves. How often has Christmas itself arrived at your door before you were really ready for it? You may perhaps have just about decorated the tree and made the cake, or

whatever it is in your home, but you are in no sense ready for the beauty and the mystery and the emotion of Christmas. You may be dog-tired already and possibly fed up with carols and tinsel and mince pies. Christmas itself passes in a blur of tiredness and then it is suddenly all about New Year.

So maybe take more time during Advent this year. Slow down a bit. Make time in your day for silence, for prayers, for reading. Make space in your heart for the coming of the Christ child.


Deanery Quiet Day 2026

Book Review



Paula Griffiths, an Anglican priest in Saffron Walden, has written a very accessible and interesting set of reflections on John's Gospel. It is called *The Mystery of John*. It is not a detailed Bible study, nor is it a text to accompany prayer or contemplation. Rather, it is a series of themed explorations of John's Gospel, often contrasting and comparing it with the other three (synoptic) Gospels.

Griffiths takes one idea for each chapter

and explores that theme through both the text itself and her own reflections on the text. Examples are: who 'the Beloved Disciple' was; the particular portrait of Jesus given by John; John and bread; light and darkness; John and the synoptics.

This is a book that assumes that the reader has a basic knowledge of all four Gospels, but does not assume any detailed knowledge, and throughout the book the author reproduces the Bible passages she comments on, making it a very easy read.

It should be of interest to anyone who finds John's Gospel intriguing or puzzling.



Advent Reading

The beautiful season of Advent, as we prepare ourselves for the great mystery of the incarnation, is a very good time to commit to the spiritual discipline of reading, prayer and contemplation.

Here are some suggestions for recently published materials, one of which might be right for you:

Waiting for Jesus, by Rich Villodas (Ebury Publishing) – a series of daily reflections and prayers on four themes: waiting, peacemaking, rejoicing, and beholding.

Donkey Roads and Camel Treks, by Gemma Simmonds (BRF) – a familiar format of bible passage, meditation, questions and prayer with a strong sense of movement on a journey forwards to meet the Lord, inspired by a pilgrimage to the Holy Land in 2019.


O Come Emmanuel, by various authors (Church House Publishing) – short daily reflections on the Advent Antiphons, accompanied by some beautiful drawings and links to further related online materials, including music. Some readers of this newsletter may remember the Advent Antiphons from our discussion group meetings in 2022.

A Child is Born: A Beginner's Guide to Nativity Stories, by Amy-Jill Levine (Abingdon Press) – a study of three nativity stories from the Old Testament (Isaac and Ishmael, Samson, and Samuel), providing a lens through which to see the birth of Jesus. It is possible that this might be the book we choose for our Advent discussion groups this year, but that is yet to be decided.

Churches of Somerset by Phil Draper



Somerset is renowned for its churches, many of which were built on the wealth of the wool industry in this area in the Middle Ages. Bath, Glastonbury and Wells were powerful ecclesiastical centres in this period, but there are many fascinating and beautiful churches to be found throughout the county's towns and villages, whether small and humble, grand or unusual. They

are found in a wide variety of landscapes, from the Mendip and Quantock hills, Exmoor, the Bristol Channel coastline and the edge of Bristol to the flat, marshy areas of the Levels and agricultural river valleys, and two of our own churches are featured in this book: Holy Trinity, Wyke Champflower, and St Mary's, Bruton.

The distinctive Somerset church towers can be seen throughout the county and often a wealth of medieval carving welcomes the visitor. Later buildings from the Georgian and Victorian era show the changing identity of areas where industry developed and population grew into today's many faces of Somerset.

In *Churches of Somerset*, author Phil Draper explores a crosssection of historical churches throughout the county, both the well known and those waiting to be discovered by a wider audience. This fascinating picture of an important part of the history of Somerset over the centuries will be of interest to all those who live in or are visiting this splendid county in England.



Kimberley Snapshot

When were you born?

This is the Walcott Inlet – the European name for this beautiful country – but the local Worora Tribe called in *Munja*. It was the Spirit Country of the wonderful Wattie Ngerdu – a lawman and song writer (the song writers are the ones who keep the history alive). During WW2 Wattie was a coast watcher. It was his job to check the planes approaching the Western Australian coast: Japanese planes bombed Broome, Darwin and Kalumburu.

Wattie, with my friend Elkin Umbagai, were my treasured go-to people for information about the members of the community. When we first got to Mowanjum there was abject poverty, mainly because very few people were in receipt of the government allowances to which they were entitled. The reason for this was that no one knew how old the people were! So, the task at hand was to establish the ages of each and every one of the members of the community. People who had been born after the tribes were moved from Munja to Derby had been registered, but I had a large number of people whose births had not been registered anywhere at all.

Traditionally when a child reaches puberty there is an initiation ceremony – referred to by the community as becoming a young man or woman – which happens around the age of 12. The Department of Aboriginal Affairs granted that if we could get two

older people to agree on the initiation times of various individuals, they would accept that their birth year must be 12 years before that. Elkin had worked out her birth year as 1927, but Wattie had worked out his year in a unique way. His explanation is immediately recognisable: "O Missus, I became a young man in the same year that the King's son ran off with that bad woman." After giggling more than a little bit, I worked out that Wattie had been initiated in 1938, when he would have been 12, and therefore his birth year was 1926. We managed to assign an age to every one of our older people this way.





Saying Goodbye

Saying Goodbye, (part of Mariposa International (SG)) are coming to Wiltshire next month with a very special Baby Loss Remembrance and Support Service.

Mariposa International (SG)'s core objective is to support people who have lost babies at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in infancy. With over 258,000 babies being lost yearly in the UK alone, the charity is able to offer not only a comprehensive package of befriending and support but also national baby loss remembrance services (called Saying Goodbye Services), for people to join together and remember the children they had lost.

On 22 November at 4pm in Malmesbury Cathedral, we will be hosting one of our Saying Goodbye Services, and as this is the most local service to you this year, we wanted to share this information with you.

So who is the service for?

Anyone who has lost a baby at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in early years, or who has been affected by family members' or friends' loss. Whether the loss was recent or 80 years ago, everyone is welcome to attend. We have also extended the services, and gladly welcome anyone who is grieving the fact that they haven't had children due to circumstance, infertility, or for other reasons. Babies and children are also invited to come with their families, as the Saying Goodbye service is truly a family event for all.

When a baby is lost, whether during pregnancy, at birth or in infancy, it is a devastating experience for the parents and the extended family.

Sadly for people that lose prior to 24-weeks gestation, services to commemorate the life that has been lost are seldom held, while for parents who lose later in pregnancy, at birth or in early years, the parents are usually in the depths of grief when a service is held.

The Saying Goodbye services are the first international set of remembrance services, for people who have suffered the loss of a baby at any stage, and whether that be recently or decades ago. They provide a time and place to acknowledge and remember your baby, whilst collectively 'saying goodbye'.

The services also welcome anyone grieving the fact that they have been unable to have children.

The services are for people of any faith or no faith, are free to attend, no tickets need to be booked, and people are invited to bring family, friends and children with them. Held at cathedrals and similar venues across the globe, chosen for their beauty and grandeur; a wonderful tribute is created for all lost babies.


Together we will stand and say, "our children may have only been on this earth for days, weeks, months or years, but they were truly loved, and will always be missed!"

Redwings on the wing

Throughout Autumn something special is happening in our night skies. Huge numbers of redwing are migrating from Northern European forests, which empty of most bird species before



winter strikes. Coming from Scandinavia and Russia they migrate into the UK, Ireland and western France. Bird books describe the redwing call as seeih and once you have learned it, you may hear a redwing call overhead every few minutes, wherever you are in the UK, as they pass over in a wave of birds. There are a few pairs (about 80) of redwing breeding in Scotland but really, they are a winter visitor to our shores.

Redwings are a small thrush, of similar size to our song thrush but with darker brown plumage and the characteristic flash of colour from the red feathers on their under-wings as they fly. Look out for them feeding in the churchyard, you may be seeing birds fuelling up on migration or winter visitors who will stay for a few months. Redwings feed on berries, fallen fruit and will find soil invertebrates



in short grass, pulling up worms or digging out leather jackets. They can be seen in flocks, with other thrushes such as fieldfare, mistle thrush and song thrush, feasting on yew berries and making a real mess! Winter

thrushes descending on churchyard yews is one of the sights that chart the changing seasons.

You can help redwing and other thrushes by providing berry bearing shrubs and trees and thinking of your hedges as larders for weary travellers. Leave hedges untrimmed until February or early March so that birds may shelter within them and feed on hedge fruits such as hawthorn berries. Churchyards are usually free of pesticides which allows soil invertebrates to thrive, providing lots of nutritious meals. Yew trees provide both food and shelter and also give us the opportunity to really look at these lovely birds and think about the long journey they have made to reach us.
